

## **Oral Statement from Lawyers for Lawyers (L4L)**

Human Rights Committee's review of the 7th Periodic Report of the Russian Federation – Formal NGO briefing – Geneva – 16 March 2015 Speaker: Ms Judith I.A. Lichtenberg

Lawyers for Lawyers<sup>i</sup> would like to draw the Committee's attention to the failure of the Russian authorities to ensure the right to effective legal representation.<sup>ii</sup>

Lawyers increasingly face threats, physical attacks and harassment due to their professional duties.  $^{\rm iii}$ 

Since we issued our submission to the Committee in April 2014,<sup>iv</sup> at least two lawyers have been killed.<sup>v</sup> They represented a key witness in a criminal case. Two others were physically attacked after defending their clients – an LGBTI rights activist<sup>vi</sup> and a supposed terrorist<sup>vii</sup> - in court. One lawyer needed hospital treatment after the attack.<sup>viii</sup> A third lawyer was assaulted in his office. He is involved in election fraud cases.<sup>ix</sup>

There are no reports indicating that any arrests were made in relation to these crimes. In one case, the police refused assistance.<sup>x</sup>

Lawyers also increasingly face improper interference by investigators. Recent examples show that investigators try to exclude lawyers from cases by all means. They interrogate lawyers as witnesses in their clients' cases.<sup>xi</sup> They issue fabricated complaints against lawyers to their bar associations.<sup>xii</sup> They put pressure on clients to replace their lawyers for someone more loyal to the authorities.<sup>xiii</sup>

All these lawyers have also received threats in relation to their work.

Lawyers for Lawyers would like to clarify one matter: Magamed Abubakarov received and reported (life) threats to the police in the Republic of Kabardino-Balkaria in February 2013 instead of Grozny.<sup>xiv</sup>

We call on the Committee to strengthen its previous recommendations for the Russian Federation to protect lawyers and refrain from taking measures that constitute harassment and persecution of lawyers and unnecessarily interfere with their defence of clients.<sup>xv</sup>
